



A cross-cutting sector, the 3rd largest economic activity in the EU (after Distribution and Construction)

Involves a big diversity of services and professions

Mainly dominated by SMEs

Socio-economic importance of tourism:

- 5% of the EU GDP
- 5.2% of the total labour force
- 9.7 million jobs

But with the related sectors:

- 10% of the EU GDP
- 12% of the total labour force
- 24 million jobs


We need Cooperation in the tourism

We know that tourism can destroy tourism

Therefore we need more sustainable tourism

Cycling is very environmentally friendly





Bicycle tourism

- Since several decades an increase of 20% per year
- The infrastructure on the coast is then used for ten months
- The loipes for Skiing is used for the cycle route as well
- Bicycle tourists without accomodation spend 35 € a day, car tourists only 10 € and therefore support the local economy
- Investment costs for bicycle infrastructure are low while benefits are high
- Finnish study (Helsinki): For one invested Euro, the return is eight (!) times more
- Example of the Danube Cycle Route in Serbia: After signposting an increase from 500 cycle tourists in 2008 to 13 000 in 2012

Cycling is very healthy

Non-cyclists are three times more ill than cyclists

Cyclists live five years longer than non-cyclists

Cycle tourism has also a big economic effect

Cycle industry creates 700.000 jobs

- more than in coal mines
- more than in steel production

In 2020 it would be 1 Million jobs


Cycle tourism in Brandenburg

23% of all tourists in Brandenburg are cycle tourists

Positive for the local economy and for small and medium-sized enterprises

EU-funding

Allocation of EU co-funding by mode of transport



Hungary leads the way: It uses 2% of EU funding for cycling

Support of Cycle tourism

EU-Cofinance up to 85%

In Germany, Latvia and other member states there is no federal financial support

Therefore it is difficult for the regions and the cities to finance the missing 15 %



Carriage of bicycles on trains has to be improved!

- The European Parliament has voted with a big majority that bicycles have to be accepted on all trains, also on high-speed trains.
- The second chamber of the German Parliament (**Bundesrat**) requests that unaniomousely!
- In **Austria** it has been realized, also for austrian high-speed trains. Not only for the new trains the old ones have been retrofitted as well.
- In **Germany** it is possible to take bicycles on all regional trains and on the new high-speed trains (ICE 4).
- In Russia it is not possible on the "Allegro" from Helsinki to St Petersburg
- Airlines make bicycle transport very much easier no separate package
- By being bike-unfriendly the railway companies chase away their best customers into the arms of their competitors such as busses and airlines.






